- What are the various Allied Health Professions?
 - There are various professions that are under Allied Health. The ones that are listed are available in the state of Texas. These professions include:
 - Physical Therapy Physical therapists (PTs) are movement experts who optimize quality of life through prescribed exercise, hands-on care, and patient education. Physical therapists teach patients how to prevent or manage their condition so that they will achieve long-term health benefits. PTs examine each individual and develop a plan, using treatment techniques to promote the ability to move, reduce pain, restore function, and prevent disability. In addition, PTs work with individuals to prevent the loss of mobility before it occurs by developing fitness- and wellness-oriented programs for healthier and more active lifestyles.

- What is the average program length for each Allied Health profession?
 - The Physical Therapy profession has two positions. There is a physical therapy assistant and a physical therapist. The physical therapy assistant program at STC is a total of 5 semesters (not including prerequisites) for an Associate Degree. The Physical Therapist program is available at Texas Tech, Texas State, and UT Health San Antonio. The program length is 3 years for each school for a Master or Doctorate degree.

- What are the types of schools the student can attend for their program of interest?
 - Technical schools
 - Technical schools, also known as "vocational schools" offer targeted, shorter instruction at a lower tuition, or cost, leading to a certificate or an associate's degree. Many technical schools in Texas offer dual enrollment opportunities for high school students.

 - Community College
 - A community college is an institution that offers short term certificates or two year associate's degrees. Associate's degrees transfer and often lead to four year degrees at partnering universities. Many community colleges in Texas offer dual enrollment opportunities for high school students. They typically offer less expensive education than four year universities. College

 A college is a four year institution that offers degrees in specific areas of study (i.e. medicine or law). These degrees can lead to graduate or professional school. Colleges may have open enrollment or may have strict admission requirements.

Education" or a "College of Health Sciences". Universities
also usually offer graduate (Master's, Doctorates) and

admission requirements that include grades, placements
tests, and admissions tests like the SAT/ACT.

- Where can the professionals work with their degree?
 - Physical therapist assistants work in a variety of settings including outpatient physical therapy clinics, skilled nursing facilities, hospitals, rehabilitation centers, home health agencies, schools and sports and fitness facilities. Physical therapists provide care for people in a variety of settings, including hospitals, private practices, outpatient clinics, home health agencies, schools, sports and fitness facilities, work settings and nursing homes. State licensure is required in each state in which a physical therapist practices.

- What are the Allied Health Professional's job responsibilities?
 - Physical therapy assistant's job responsibilities include
 Implementing selected components of patient/client interventions

(treatment), obtaining data related to the interventions provided and making modifications to treatments as directed by the physical therapist to help the patient progress or to ensure patient/client safety and comfort. A physical therapist's job responsibilities include diagnose patients' functions and movements by observing them stand, walk or perform activities/tasks, performing various tests and measures, design individualized plans of care based on their medical expertise, best available research, the patients' unique situations and goals and the expected outcomes of the plans; use techniques such as exercises, hands-on therapy and equipment to ease patients' pain, help them increase their mobility, prevent further pain or injury and facilitate health and wellness; evaluate a patients' progress and modify their plans of care, when necessary, to try new treatments; educate patients and their families about what to expect and how best to cope with a recovery process and develop and implement discharge plans.

- Physical therapist assistants are paid \$23.12 per hour and are paid \$48,090 annually. The projected job growth over a 10 year period is 26%. Physical therapists are paid \$42.27 per hour and are paid \$87,930 annually. The projected job growth over a 10 year period is 22%

- What exams do the students need to take for the healthcare program of interest?
 - Students who are interested in the Physical Therapist Assistant program at STC must take the HESI A2 exam before applying for the program. After the completion of the program, the student must take the National Physical Therapy examination to obtain a license to practice as a Physical Therapist Assistant.

 - The Physical Therapy program is offered at various IHEs with different exams that are required to be considered for admission. For the program at Texas State University, students must take the GRE and have competitive scores in Verbal and Quantitative. The program at Texas Tech requires the student to take the GRE and submit their exam scores. UT Health San Antonio requires the GRE to be taken with the Verbal score to be 150+ and the Quantitative score to be 145+. After the completion of the program, the student must take the National Physical Therapy examination to obtain a license to practice as a Physical Therapist.

Tenth Grade

- What exams do students need to take before being admitted into the program?
 - The HESI A2 is an exam that most colleges require the student to take before applying for their nursing programs. The subjects that are tested are English Language (Reading, Grammer, Vocabulary), Math, and Science (Anatomy and Physiology). The student can register for the exam at Evolve.Elsevier.com. There are various testing centers that offer this exam. When registering, the student can select where they would like to take the exam. To prepare for the exam, the student can use a HESI A2 workbook that can be bought online or at a bookstore. To pass the exam they must score at least a 75% or higher on each section, which will then be calculated into an average.

Eleventh Grade

- Where can a student register to take these exams? What are the scores needed to be considered for the programs of interest?
 - The Hesi A2 exam requires a 75% or better in all the sections of Science (Anatomy and Physiology), Math, and English Language. The student can register for the exam at Evolve.Elsevier.com. There are various testing centers that offer this exam. When registering, the student can select where they would like to take the exam. To prepare for the exam, the student can use a HESI A2 workbook that can be bought online or at a bookstore.

 - The GRE General Test measures your verbal reasoning, quantitative reasoning, critical thinking and analytical writing skills skills that have been developed over a long period of time and

are not related to a specific field of study but are important for all. The GRE scores vary depending on what the IHE wants for the student's program of interest. To be considered for the healthcare program, high scores on the GRE categories are the best to have a good chance of entering the program. The different categories include Verbal Reasoning, Quantitative Reasoning, and Analytical Writing. Verbal Reasoning section measures your ability to:

- analyze and draw conclusions from discourse; reason from incomplete data; identify author's assumptions and/or perspective; understand multiple levels of meaning, such as literal, figurative and author's intent
- select important points; distinguish major from minor or irrelevant points; summarize text; understand the structure of a text
- understand the meanings of words, sentences and entire texts; understand relationships among words and among concepts
- Quantitative Reasoning section measures your ability to:
 - understand, interpret and analyze quantitative information
 - solve problems using mathematical models
 - apply basic skills and elementary concepts of arithmetic, algebra, geometry and data analysis
- Analytical Writing section measures your ability to:
 - articulate complex ideas clearly and effectively
 - support ideas with relevant reasons and examples
 - examine claims and accompanying evidence
 - sustain a well-focused, coherent discussion
 - Control the elements of standard written English
- The GRE® General Test is available at more than 1,000 test centers in more than 160 countries. It is offered as a computer-delivered test year-round at most locations around the world and as a paper-delivered test up to three times a year in areas where computer-delivered testing is not available. Twelfth Grade

- Are there any exams that need to be taken after the completion of the healthcare program for Physical Therapy?
 - To become a Physical Therapy assistant or a Physical Therapist, the student must take the National Physical Therapy Examination. The PT and PTA exams are designed to assess your basic entry-level competence after graduation from an accredited program or from an equivalent non-accredited program. The NPTE purpose is to help ensure that only those individuals who have the requisite knowledge of physical therapy are licensed in the physical therapy field and to help regulatory authorities evaluate candidates and provide standards that are comparable from jurisdiction to jurisdiction.

 - The NPTE was developed to measure knowledge and abilities required of entry-level physical therapists (PTs) and physical therapist assistants (PTAs). The exam consists of objective, multiple-choice questions covering the major areas of physical therapy. The PT exam includes 250 items and the PTA exam includes 200 items. The exams go over a variety of subjects such as body systems, equipment, safety and responsibilities.

 - To take the NPTE, students must meet the eligibility requirements which include:
 - **Registration and Payment -** Submit an online registration and pay the registration fee.
 - Education Have a degree appropriate for the exam level from a CAPTE (Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education) accredited institution, or have an education that has been determined to be substantially equivalent by a recognized credentialing agency.
 - Attempt Limits -
 - Maximum consecutive attempts is three per exam level. After three consecutive exam attempts at any exam level, candidates will not be able to register for the next exam date.

- Maximum attempts in a lifetime is six per exam level.
- No more than two scores of 400 or less after January
 1, 2016 at an exam level.
- Proof Of TOEFL Completion Graduates of non-CAPTE accredited programs must enter the date of their most recent TOEFL exam and the scores for each part.
- Proof of Educational Equivalence Graduates from non-CAPTE accredited programs must demonstrate that their education is substantially equivalent to the education of individuals who graduate from CAPTE-accredited programs, as determined by a recognized credentialing agency.
- Security Have complied with any test security requests made by FSBPT staff; Have completed any sanctions related to a disciplinary action taken by FSBPT.
- **Approval** Be approved by the licensing authority (board) in the state or jurisdiction where you intend to be licensed.

- The FSBPT will release the student's score five days after the exam to the license authority that the student applied for. The FSBPT offers prep courses to help the student prepare for the licensure exam.

Although many physical therapists practice in hospitals, more than 80 percent practice in:

 - Inpatient rehabilitation facilities
 - Skilled nursing, extended care, or subacute facilities
 - Homes
 - Education or research centers
 - Schools
 - Hospices
 - Industrial, workplace, or other occupational environments
 - Fitness centers and sports training facilities

 - Physical therapist assistants (PTAs) provide physical therapy services under the direction and supervision of a licensed physical therapist. PTAs help people of all ages who have medical problems, or other health-related conditions that limit their ability to move and perform functional activities in their daily lives. PTAs may also measure changes in the patient's performance as a result of the physical therapy provided. PTAs work in a variety of settings including hospitals, private practices, outpatient clinics, home health, nursing homes, schools, sports facilities, and more.

What is the Physical Therapy program at Texas State University?

- What are the admission requirements for the Physical Therapy Assistant program at South Texas College?
 - Participate in the required Prospective Student Information session.

- Be admitted to the college as a high school graduate or GED equivalent
- Meet TSI College Readiness Standards, or meet TSI exemption standards (view testing requirements).
- Complete all prerequisite courses with a minimum grade of "B" as listed in the Physical Therapist Assistant Program degree plan.
 BIOL 2401 Anatomy and Physiology I must be completed within the past five years and PTHA 1409 Introduction to Physical Therapy must be completed within the past two years
- Complete the HESI A2 (Admissions Assessment) Exam as follows: Achieve an English Language Composite Score of 75% or higher, a Science (Anatomy & Physiology) Score of 75% or higher, and a Math Score of 75% or higher. Scores must be current within the last 2 years. HESI A2 Exemptions are not permitted (click here for testing requirements).
- Earn a minimum grade of "B" in "Introduction to Physical Therapy" course within the last two years. Required HESI A2 English Language Composite, Science, and Math test scores are needed to register for this course.
- Earn a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale in all courses, including transfer courses, and those completed at STC.
- Pass a criminal background check, 10-panel drug screen through approved providers, and complete all required immunizations including Hepatitis B series. Students with criminal histories must provide proof of licensure eligibility from the Executive Council of Physical Therapy and Occupational Therapy Examiners (ECPTOTE). This process may take up to 6 months to complete. For more information contact the NAH Clinical Affairs Specialist at 872-3022.
- Submit <u>Documentation of Experience Forms</u> as evidence of a minimum of twenty-five (25) hours of volunteer or work experience under the supervision of a PT or PTA in two different settings, for a total of fifty (50) hours. One experience should be completed in an inpatient setting (hospital or nursing facility), and the other should be completed in a different type of setting such as an outpatient clinic or pediatric center. Home Health hours are not accepted.

- Therapists who supervise volunteer experiences cannot be a relative or personal friend of the student applicant.
- Meet <u>Technical Standards</u> as stated by the Physical Therapist Assistant program.
- Submit a completed Program application by stated deadline. For more information contact the Physical Therapist Assistant Program at 872-3161 or access the information online at http://nah.southtexascollege.edu/pta/.

What are the admission requirements for the Physical Therapy program at Texas State?

- Complete an undergraduate degree from an accredited institution prior to enrollment.
- Meet the requirements for Graduate College admission.
- Have a minimum of 3.00 GPA (overall).
- Have a minimum of 3.00 GPA (last 60 hours toward degree).
- Have a minimum of 3.00 GPA on all science courses (biology, chemistry, and physics).
- Have a minimum of 3.00 GPA on all prerequisite course requirements. Have competitive GRE scores in Verbal and Quantitative.

What are the admission requirements for the Physical Therapy program at UT Health San Antonio?

- Bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited college or university
- A grade of C or better in the individual prerequisite classes
- Graduate Record Examination (GRE): with a preferred score of 150 or higher in Verbal and 145 or higher in Quantitative. GRE code for PTCAS 7558.
- Completion of a Medical Terminology Course (college/university or online certification course)
- Two letters of reference (at least one letter from a licensed physical therapist) sent directly to PTCAS
- Personal written statement/essay found online in the PTCAS application
- Overall GPA 3.2 and Math and Science prerequisite GPA 3.2
- Personal resume including previous work experience, honors, awards, extracurricular activities, and community service experience - upload to PTCAS
- Submission in PTCAS of a minimum of 50 observation hours gained through volunteering or employment in a physical therapy setting with a licensed Physical Therapist that demonstrates knowledge and understanding of physical therapy

 - Physical Therapists and Physical Therapy assistants are required to take CE courses to maintain their license every 2 years. Physical therapists are required to take at least 30 hours of CE courses. Physical Therapy Assistants are required to take at least 20 hours of CE courses.

Ninth Grade

- What is Dual Enrollment?
 - The term dual enrollment refers to students being enrolled—concurrently—in two academic programs or institutions. The term is used in reference to high school students taking college courses while they are still enrolled in high school (i.e., a dual-enrollment student), or to the programs that allow high school students to take college-level courses (i.e., a dual-enrollment *program*). For this reason, the term *early college* is a common synonym for dual enrollment.

 - The student needs to be aware that the grades they receive in any dual or concurrent enrollment courses will stay with them throughout their college career. These grades will be averaged into their overall college GPA.

Is high school coursework relevant to Allied Health?

■ The student might not realize it, but preparing for a future career starts in high school (or even earlier). For example, did you know that nurses use algebra when calculating medication dosages? What the student learns in high school builds the foundation for their college education and career. If a student is considering

nursing, they should take classes *now* that will prepare them for college *later*.

O Does high school GPA matter?

Most healthcare programs often set the minimum GPA at 3.0. Some programs are more likely to set the minimum somewhere in the 2.0 to 2.75 range. Grades in prerequisite courses may be considered separately. *These are minimum requirements and to be competitive, the student should aim much higher. When interest exceeds available spots, grades are often an important factor.

- What is the difference between AP and Dual Enrollment?
 - Dual enrollment courses allow students to get early access to college courses. AP courses are different because they only result in college credit if a student earns a particular score on the AP exam at the end of the course, and if the college that the student enrolls in, accepts AP scores as course credit. This means students who complete a dual enrollment program have a college transcript at the end of their high school career and can enroll directly into that college or transfer these courses if they move to another institution. AP courses on the other hand result in an AP score that can be submitted to a college. The college can then decide if the score will amount to any college credit.
