# What are the types of schools the student can attend for their program of interest?

- Technical schools
  - Technical schools, also known as "vocational schools" offer targeted, shorter instruction at a lower tuition, or cost, leading to a certificate or an associate's degree. Many technical schools in Texas offer dual enrollment opportunities for high school students. https://scitexas.edu/technical-school/
- Community College
  - A community college is an institution that offers short term certificates or two year associate's degrees. Associate's degrees transfer and often lead to four year degrees at partnering universities. Many community colleges in Texas offer dual enrollment opportunities for high school students. They typically offer less expensive education than four year universities. # College

- A college is a four year institution that offers degrees in specific areas of study (i.e. medicine or law). These degrees can lead to graduate or professional school. Colleges may have open enrollment or may have strict admission requirements.

- University
  - A University is a four year institution that offers many different degrees through multiple "colleges" located on the same campus. Typically a university may have a "College of

Education" or a "College of Health Sciences". Universities also usually offer graduate (Master's, Doctorates) and professional degrees. Typically, universities have strict admission requirements that include grades, placements tests, and admissions tests like the SAT/ACT.

## Ninth Grade

- What exams do the students need to take for their healthcare program of interest?
  - Texas Tech and UT Health San Antonio both have Speech Language Pathologist programs. Texas Tech and UT Health San Antonio requires the GRE to be taken to be considered for the program. The graduates must take the Praxis Exam to receive their license to practice.

- What exams do students need to take before being admitted into the program?
  - The ACT is an entrance exam used by most colleges and universities to make admissions decisions. The purpose of the ACT test is to measure a high school student's readiness for college,

and provide colleges with one common data point that can be used to compare all applicants. The sections of the exam are English, Math, Reading, Science, and Writing (optional).

## • Eleventh Grade

- Where can a student register to take these exams? What are the scores needed to be considered for the programs of interest?
  - The GRE General Test measures your verbal reasoning, quantitative reasoning, critical thinking and analytical writing skills skills that have been developed over a long period of time and are not related to a specific field of study but are important for all. The GRE scores vary depending on what the IHE wants for the student's program of interest. To be considered for the healthcare program, high scores on the GRE categories are the best to have a good chance of entering the program. The different categories include Verbal Reasoning, Quantitative Reasoning, and Analytical Writing. Verbal Reasoning section measures your ability to:
    - analyze and draw conclusions from discourse; reason from incomplete data; identify author's assumptions and/or perspective; understand multiple levels of meaning, such as literal, figurative and author's intent
    - select important points; distinguish major from minor or irrelevant points; summarize text; understand the structure of a text
    - understand the meanings of words, sentences and entire texts; understand relationships among words and among concepts
  - Quantitative Reasoning section measures your ability to:
    - understand, interpret and analyze quantitative information
    - solve problems using mathematical models
    - apply basic skills and elementary concepts of arithmetic, algebra, geometry and data analysis
  - Analytical Writing section measures your ability to:
    - articulate complex ideas clearly and effectively
    - support ideas with relevant reasons and examples
    - examine claims and accompanying evidence
    - sustain a well-focused, coherent discussion
    - control the elements of standard written English

- What exam does the student need to take after completing the Speech-Language Pathology program?
  - The Praxis is a certification exam needed to become a certified Speech-Language Pathologist. The current passing score in speech-language pathology is 162. In order for an applicant's score to be accepted for ASHA certification, it must be reported to ASHA by ETS. The Praxis exams are administered through the Prometric Testing Centers.

# What is the Speech Language Pathologist program at UT Health San Antonio?

- The Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology (MS-SLP) degree program is a two-year (5 semesters) graduate study grounded on integration of academic coursework with clinical experience. Having the program embedded in the School of Health Professions enables this program to have its emphasis in medical speech-language pathology. Coursework is particularly designed and sequenced to provide students with the scientific and professional education for work as speech-language pathologists in diverse medical settings. The program is unique in its curricular specification and application of knowledge within a community-based clinical education framework. Training in a health science campus environment with direct access and constant exposure to the medical community provides graduates with medically-based training to serve children and adults with health care and educational needs.

#### Ninth Grade

- What is Dual Enrollment?
  - The term dual enrollment refers to students being enrolled—concurrently—in two academic programs or institutions. The term is used in reference to high school students taking college courses while they are still enrolled in high school (i.e., a dual-enrollment student), or to the programs that allow high school students to take college-level courses (i.e., a dual-enrollment program). For this reason, the term early college is a common synonym for dual enrollment.
  - The student needs to be aware that the grades they receive in any dual or concurrent enrollment courses will stay with them throughout their college career. These grades will be averaged into their overall college GPA.

# Does high school GPA matter?

■ Most healthcare programs often set the minimum GPA at 3.0. Some programs are more likely to set the minimum somewhere in the 2.0 to 2.75 range. Grades in prerequisite courses may be considered separately. \*These are minimum requirements and to be competitive, the student should aim much higher. When interest exceeds available spots, grades are often an important factor.

## Eleventh Grade

- What is the difference between AP and Dual Enrollment?
  - Dual enrollment courses allow students to get early access to college courses. AP courses are different because they only result in college credit if a student earns a particular score on the AP exam at the end of the course, and if the college that the student enrolls in, accepts AP scores as course credit. This means students who complete a dual enrollment program have a college transcript at the end of their high school career and can enroll directly into that college or transfer these courses if they move to another institution. AP courses on the other hand result in an AP score that can be submitted to a college. The college can then decide if the score will amount to any college credit.

  - For the SLP program at Texas Tech, the student must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0, and a minimum GPA of 3.0 in undergraduate audiology and speech pathology courses.
